**Ans 13.** Ampere's circuital law  $\rightarrow$  states that the line integral of the magnetic field  $\vec{B}$  around any closed circuit is equal to  $\mu_0$  (permeability constant) times the total current  $I$  threading or passing through this closed circuit. Mathematically,

$$\oint \vec{B} \cdot d\vec{l} = \mu_0 I$$

magnetic field due to straight infinite current carrying wire  $\rightarrow$

Fig. shows a circular loop of radius  $r$  around an infinitely long straight wire carrying current  $I$ . As the field lines are circular, the field  $\vec{B}$  at any point of the circular loop is directed along the tangent to the circle at that point. By symmetry, the magnitude of field  $\vec{B}$  is same at every point of the circular loop. Therefore,



$$\oint \vec{B} \cdot d\vec{l} = \oint B dl \cos 0^\circ = B \oint dl = B \cdot 2\pi r$$

From Ampere's circuital law,

$$B \cdot 2\pi r = \mu_0 I$$

$$\therefore B = \frac{\mu_0 I}{2\pi r}$$

**OR**

Principle of cyclotron  $\rightarrow$  A charged particle can be accelerated to very high energies by making it pass through a moderate electric field a number of times. This can be done with the help of a perpendicular magnetic field which throws the charged particle into a circular motion, the frequency of which does not depend on the speed of the particle and the radius of the circular orbit.

Time period of revolution  $\rightarrow$  Let a particle of charge  $q$  and mass  $m$  enter a region of magnetic field  $\vec{B}$  with a velocity  $\vec{v}$ , normal to the field  $\vec{B}$ . The particle follows a circular path, the necessary centripetal force being, provided by the magnetic field. Therefore,

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Magnetic force on charge } q & \\ &= \text{Centripetal force on charge } q \end{aligned}$$

$$\text{or } q v B \sin 90^\circ = \frac{mv^2}{r}$$

$$\text{or } r = \frac{mv}{qB}$$

Period of revolution of the charged particle is given by

$$T = \frac{2\pi r}{v} = \frac{2\pi}{v} \cdot \frac{mv}{qB} = \frac{2\pi m}{qB}$$

Clearly Time period is independent on the velocity of the particle.

It is necessary for the operation of cyclotron so that freq<sup>n</sup> of revolution must will be equal to the freq<sup>n</sup> of AC source.

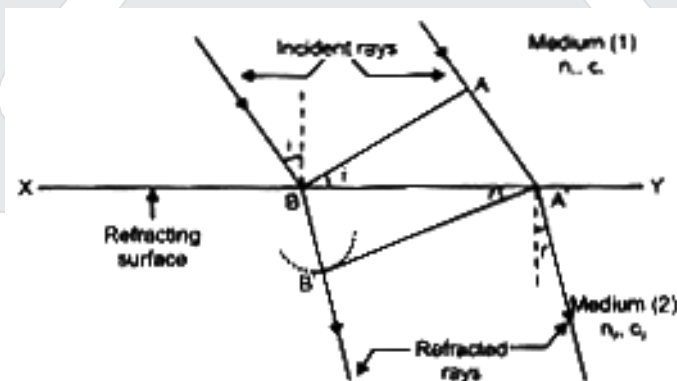

Let AB be the plane wavefront incident on a refracting surface XY at an angle of incidence  $i$ . Let medium (1) be the rarer medium where the speed of light is  $C_1$ , and medium 2 be the denser medium where the speed is  $C_2$ .

First of all, the disturbance from wavefront AB strikes at the point B. By the time  $\left( t = \frac{AA'}{C_1} \right)$  disturbance

from A reaches A', disturbance from B would have spread in the second medium in the form of hemispherical wavelet of radius  $BB'$   $\left( = C_2 t = C_2 \times \frac{AA'}{C_1} \right)$ . Tangent from A' on this wavelet gives refracted wavefront A'B'.

Wavefront A'B' makes an angle  $r$  with refracting surface.

$$\text{In } \triangle BAA', \sin i = \frac{AA'}{BA'}$$

$$\text{In } \triangle BB'A', \sin r = \frac{BB'}{BA'}$$

$$\frac{\sin i}{\sin r} = \frac{AA'/BA'}{BB'/BA'}$$

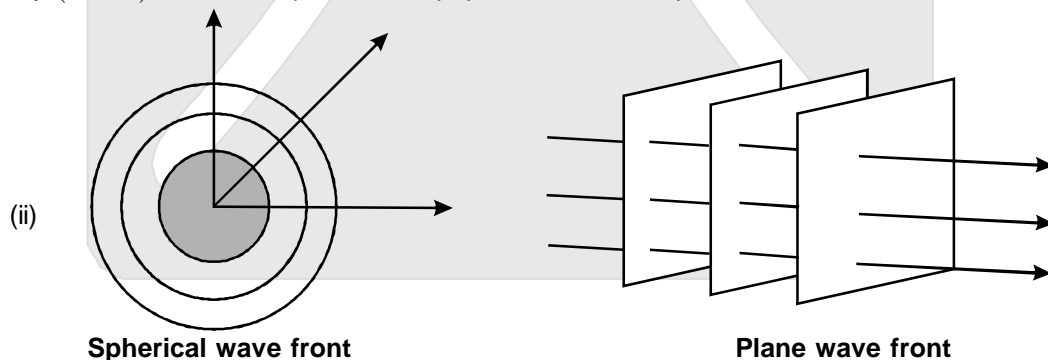

This is Snell's law or first law of refraction.

Second law: The incident wavefront AB, the refracting surface XY and the refracted wavefront A'B' are all perpendicular to plane of paper. So the incident ray ( $\perp AB$ ); the normal ( $\perp XY$ ) and the refracted ray ( $\perp A'B'$ ) all lie in the plane of the paper i.e., the same plane. This is second law of refraction.

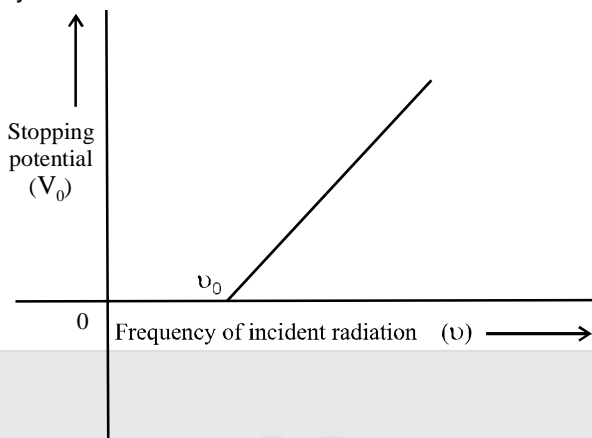

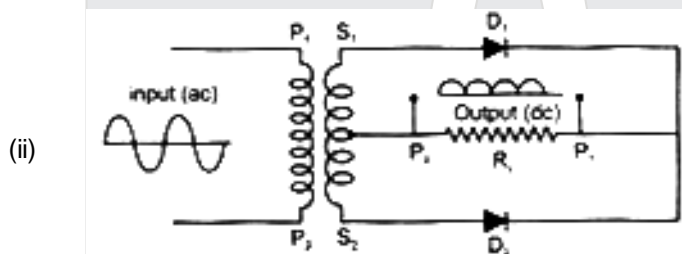

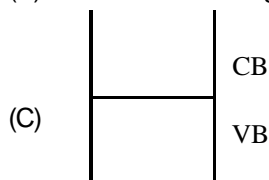


**Ans 18.** (i) Two important processes occur during the formation of a p-n junction are diffusion and drift.



The ac to be transformed is connected as shown across primary  $P_1P_2$  of a transformer. In 1<sup>st</sup> half of ac cycle, suppose  $P_1$  is negative and  $P_2$  is positive. This make  $S_1$  positive and  $S_2$  negative. As a result,  $D_1$  is forward biased and hence conducting. The current flows through  $D_1$  and form  $P_1$  to  $P_2$  through  $R_1$  and we get an output.  $D_2$  does not conduct in this half as it is reverse biased. Similarly in second half,  $D_1$  does not conduct but  $D_2$  conducts being forward biased making the current flow form  $P_1$  to  $P_2$  again.

The instantaneous power p supplied by the source is

$$p = vi = (v_m \sin \omega t) \times [i_m \sin(\omega t + \phi)]$$

$$= \frac{V_m i_m}{2} [\cos \phi - \cos(2\omega t + \phi)]$$

The average power over a cycle is given by the average of the two terms in R.H.S. of Eq. It is only the second term which is time-dependent. Its average is zero (the positive half of the cosine cancels the negative half). Therefore.

$$P = \frac{V_m i_m}{2} \cos \phi = \frac{V_m}{\sqrt{2}} \frac{i_m}{\sqrt{2}} \cos \phi$$

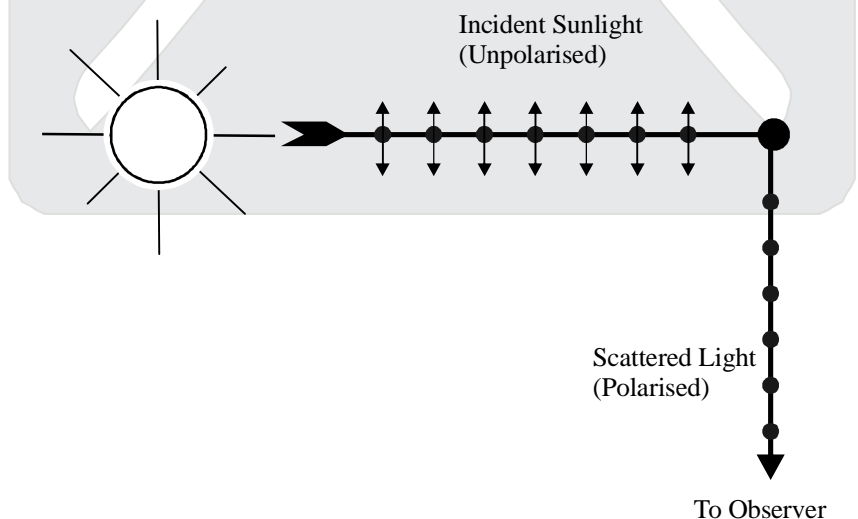

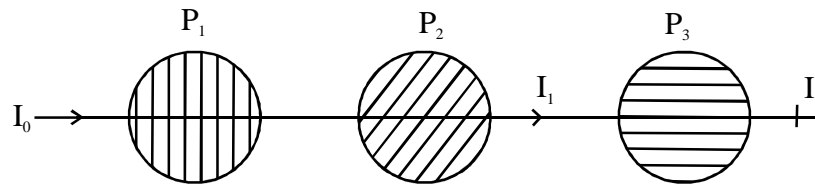
- Ans 26.** (a) A polaroid consists of long chain molecules. aligned in a particular direction. The electric vectors along the direction of aligned molecules get absorbed. Thus if the unpolarised light from a source passes through a polaroid, its intensity is reduced by half. Rotating the polaroid has no effect on the transmitted beam and transmitted. intensity remains constant.

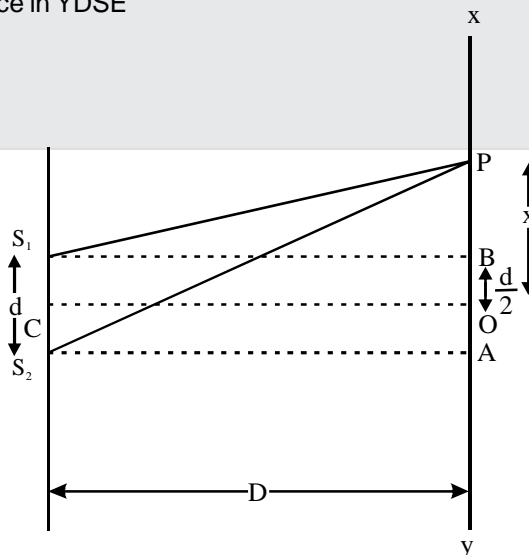

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In fig.  $S_1$  and  $S_2$  are two narrow closely spaced slits illuminated by monochromatic light of wavelength  $\lambda$ , XY is the screen on which interference pattern is observed, If  $S_1$  and  $S_2$  emit light in same phase, then for point O, on right bisector of  $S_1S_2$  the path difference receives light in same phase. The superposition at O is constructive producing a bright point, called the central maxima. The intensity at any point P at a distance x from O depends on the path difference between light reaching P from  $S_1$  and  $S_2$ .

We have path difference  $p = S_2P - S_1P$

$$\begin{aligned} \text{We have } S_2P^2 &= S_2A^2 + AP^2 \\ &= D^2 + (AO + OP)^2 \\ &= D^2 + \left(x + \frac{d}{2}\right)^2 \end{aligned}$$

$$\text{Similarly } S_1P^2 = D^2 + \left(x - \frac{d}{2}\right)^2$$

The resultant intensity at a point is maximum when the phase difference between the two superposing waves is an even multiple of  $\pi$  or path difference is an integral multiple of wavelength  $\lambda$ .

condition for destructive interference  $\rightarrow$

The resultant intensity at a point is minimum when the phase difference between the two superposing waves is an odd multiple of  $\pi$  or the path difference is an odd multiple of wavelength  $\lambda/2$ .

$$(b) \quad I = I_1 + I_2 + 2\sqrt{I_1I_2} \cos \phi$$

when  $\phi = 0$ , then Intensity is  $I_0$

$$\text{and, } I_1 = I_2 = I$$

$$\text{So, } I_0 = (\sqrt{I} + \sqrt{I})^2$$

$$I_0 = 4I \Rightarrow I = \frac{I_0}{4}$$

$$(i) \quad \text{when path difference is } \frac{\lambda}{6}$$

$$\text{then } \phi = \frac{\pi}{3}$$

$$\text{So, } I = I_1 + I_2 + 2\sqrt{I_1I_2} \cos \frac{\pi}{3}$$

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$$= I_1 + I_2 + \sqrt{I_1 I_2}$$

But  $I_1 = I_2 = \frac{I_0}{4}$

So,  $I = \frac{I_0}{4} + \frac{I_0}{4} + \frac{I_0}{4}$

$$I = \frac{3I_0}{4}$$

(ii) when path difference is  $\frac{\lambda}{4}$

then  $\phi = \frac{\pi}{2}$

So,  $I = I_1 + I_2 + 2\sqrt{I_1 I_2} \cos \frac{\pi}{2} = \frac{eE\tau}{mE} = \frac{e\tau}{m}$

$$= I_1 + I_2$$

But  $I_1 = I_2 = \frac{I_0}{4}$

So,  $I = \frac{I_0}{4} + \frac{I_0}{4}$

$$I = \frac{I_0}{2}$$

(ii) when path difference is  $\frac{\lambda}{3}$

then  $\phi = \frac{2\pi}{3}$

So,  $I = I_1 + I_2 + 2\sqrt{I_1 I_2} \cos \frac{2\pi}{3}$

$$= I_1 + I_2 - \sqrt{I_1 I_2}$$

But  $I_1 = I_2 = \frac{I_0}{4}$

So,  $I = \frac{I_0}{4} + \frac{I_0}{4} - \frac{I_0}{4}$

$$I = \frac{I_0}{4}$$

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
